Statement of Censorship

The American Association of Community Theatre supports a policy permitting the widest possible range of dramatic material to be performed in a festival of American community theatres. Performing companies are expected to exercise taste, good judgment and respect for the values of the host theatres.

Host theatres, if they have reason to believe a festival performance may be locally unacceptable, may notify their patrons in advance or publish a disclaimer, but in no case may the host refuse to allow the company to perform. Should the controlling body for the host theatre forbid said performance, the host group, with approval of the Festival Commission, shall provide an alternate performance space.

OPENING CEREMONIES

THE BEAR CLAN DANCERS DIRECTED BY GERALD CLEVELAND

Mr. Cleveland, a member of the Winnebago Tribe, which is comprised of 14 clans, belongs to the Bear Clan, hence the name "Bear Clan Dancers." He was taught to dance by his parents when he was very young. Cleveland's parents also taught him to do beading and construct costumes and dance regalia. Today, he and his wife, Iris make all the costumes and beadwork for the dance company. Complying with tradition, each costume is treated with utmost respect and care. The feathers worn by the dancers are from golden eagles. A dancer wearing eagle feathers must earn each one by having done something heroic or worthy. One who wears eagle feathers "must be a warrior", says Cleveland. Long fringes on the costumes represent long prairie grasses. He reports a good "grass dancer" moves in a way that keeps the fringe flowing and smooth, similar to the way wind moves the grasses. Cleveland emphasizes "smooth is always the hallmark of a good Native American dancer. Only the contemporary dance of the Fancy Dancers is allowed to be wild and unpredictable."

Cleveland is very selective in choosing those who will dance with his group. He has traveled throughout the United States to watch specific dancers. Every member of the Bear Clan Dancers is rated a World Class Dancer and takes their heritage seriously and lives by traditional standards.

Scena Plastyczna KUL of the Catholic University of Lublin is a theatrical group that was founded by Leszek Madzik in 1969. By attaching great importance to visual and, in particular, sculptural stage expressions, Scena Plastyczna KUL has developed a unique theatrical discipline. With intensified effects, Scena Plastyczna KUL has composed a minimalistic and striking stage language that speaks to everyone no matter to what history or culture they belong. Known throughout the world, they have performed in many countries including England, Russia, Egypt, France and Germany.

The Scena Plastyczna KUL is by its nature a philosophical theatre. The plot of Leszek's spectacles are related to the fundamental emotions experienced at various stages of human life as well as to the entire human existence. Misery, love, death, nostalgia, desire, fear, sensual joy or horror determine the scale of existence, the level of reflection eager to get the substance of life and the measure of spiritually contained in it. Catharsis is mixed with tragedy, emotion with anxiety, virtue with evil. The main elements constituting the substance of this theatre are space, rhythm and atmosphere. All these elements are part of human existence.

The theatrical means, chosen by Madzik to show his vision of the truth, is the artistic narration, supported by sounds. The drama of music has always given substance to the movement of visions. In all his spectacles, the power of music was harmonized with the intensity of light, which created forms and expression. From the theatrical point of view, Madzik is inspired by the dramaturgy of Gordon Craig whose creative activity in Europe extends for the first half of the 20th century. One of the characteristic features in the "theatre" without actors or rather "impersonal actors" serving as accessories. Madzik relinquishes the word, seeking very simple visual media aiming at reaching the essence of life itself.


